STRENGTH(S) OF THE DISTRICT AS YOU SEE THEM:

Considerate oversight of taxpayer dollars, management of the Superintendent, and responding effectively to concerns and interests of the community are all primary responsibilities of an elected BoE. Taking these roles seriously is critical to building trust and cultivating a safe culture that welcomes opportunities for growth and improvement. With all the moving parts of a district, we also need a Strategic Plan that is developed and maintained with collaboration from diverse stakeholders. This will provide an agreed-upon set of goals and expectations to guide decision-making and hold everyone accountable. With strong communication and clear vision, LCSD will overcome these challenging times.
